MANAGEMENT LESSONS

from the

India-Australia Test Series

2020 - 21

India had an incredible series victory in the recently concluded test series down under. What makes it more interesting is the way India bounced back after the humiliating loss in the first test match. We can learn many Management lessons from the way India outperformed Australia through its strategies. A step towards winning the series was not a cakewalk to India, it had taken lot of planning, organizing, directing, controlling, coordinating, communicating and then executing the plans into actions.

oing into the Australian
Test series as underdog,
no cricket pundits had
thought India would finish
2–1 after being all out for
36 runs in the second innings of the first
Test. After the first Test India lost the
service of their captain, who went on
paternity leave. The road to victory after
the first match did not seem easy as there
were a lot of gaps in their batting, fielding,
bowling and wicket keeping. Many players
in the team were playing in the Australian
conditions for the first time. The mission

seemed impossible as they were playing without their important Test players like Virat Kohli, Ishant Sharma and Mohammed Shami.

What happened after the first Test is history, which witnessed one of the greatest Test series victories India has won away from home. "Success is how high you bounce when you hit bottom" said George S. Patton.

From this incredible Test series, we can draw some management lessons.

LEADERSHIP

"The greatest leader is not necessarily the one who does the greatest things. He is the one that gets the people to do the greatest things" said Ronald Reagan. After the first Test, Indian captain Virat Kohli was to leave the team on paternity leave. He is one of the most successful Test captains of Indian and also a major pillar of India's batting. The vice-captain, Ajinkya Rahane took guard as stand-in captain for the next game to lead the team in an exceptional manner. After the

second Test victory the leadership style and the crucial decisions taken during the match by Rahane had impressed the cricket experts and fans. "India is lucky to have a standing captain like Rahane" said Former Australia captain, Ian Chappell.

STRATEGIC DECISIONS

"Strategy is a commodity, execution is an art" said Peter Drucker. Once Virat Kohli left the team after the first Test, the road ahead was not so easy for India going forward in the series, one of the major decisions was to be made on who would be replacing Virat Kohli for the second Test. Most of them had thought a pure batsman would be a like for like replacement for Kohli's place considering the first Test's batting collapse. Indian team management took a strategic decision to play Ravindra Jadeja, an allrounder to replace Kohli. This decision was a master stroke as Jadeja contributed significantly in India's win in the second Test with bat, ball and not to forget his contribution in fielding. The decision to replace Jadeja in the place of Kohli gained a synergy benefit to team India in the second and the third Test matches.

SUCCESSION PLANNING

"Succession planning helps build the bench strength of an organization to

ensure the long-term health, growth and stability" said Teala Wilson. In modern day cricket teams expect wicket-keepers to be a handy batsman as well. India got one of the best wicket-keeping all-rounders after a long wait in terms of M.S. Dhoni. When Dhoni was at the peak of his career, everyone wondered if India could ever get a like to replacement for Dhoni. Rishab Pant was expected to be the wicket-keeping successor for M.S. Dhoni. As he was replacing Dhoni the expectations were more but Pant did not have immediate success both with the bat and wicket-keeping in his beginning days. In spite of Pant's failures team management gave more opportunities and time to Pant. Pant was very impressive with his bat in his first Australian tour in 2018-19, becoming the first Indian wicket-keeper to score a century in Australia. In his second series in Australia in 2020-21 also Pant was very impressive with his performance becoming one of the major contributors to the historic series victory against Australia.

Grooming a player like Pant and backing him every time in spite of few failures, believing in his ability was what made Indian team management to find a right replacement for Dhoni's place in the team.

TEAM WORK

"If everyone is moving forward together, then success takes care of itself" said Henry Ford. One of the crucial factors which led to the series victory against Australia in the Test series is India's coordination and collective work as a team. The team does not mean only the playing eleven, it consists of coaches, support staff and extra players. India showcased how important is teamwork in achieving greater results. Even though they had many young players touring Australia for the first time as well as a couple of players debuted in this series, the coordination among the senior players and the youngsters was impeccable.

FUNCTIONS OF MANAGEMENT

"If you don't know where you are going, you will probably end up somewhere else" opined Laurence J Peter. After the first Test debacle team India has worked hard in their board room in order to bounce back strongly in their forthcoming matches. The functions of management viz., planning, organising, directing controlling, co-ordinating, communicating etc., were very well executed and the result was evident in the remaining matches after the first Test.

Napkin Economics Economics Economics

he election campaign debate compilations of Donald Trump from the 2016 Presidential Elections of the United States of America are a hilarious lot to go over and waste a sleepless night. These videos range from "Donald Trump Savage Moments" to "Donald Trump singing Never Gonna Give You Up". Keeping these hilarious lot aside and putting the full debates on the table for close analysis, something we will find common from the 2016 speeches of Trump are about how he sees Mexicans as

some sort of 'alien' population trying to infiltrate their way into the United States for purposes that are against the law of the country.

This infiltration that is economically termed "Migration" has been a hot topic when it comes to any political debate. This topic takes up a huge part of the limelight in politics and news media. Majority of the politicians use this as a topic to gain votes by portraying how this affects the economy badly and the wages of the native people. It is not just Trump who is famous for abusing the statistics of migration. In the 2017 French Presidential Elections, Maraine Le Pen frequently claimed that 99%

of immigrants were adult males while, in reality, only 58% were. It was also claimed by the same person that 95% of the migrants who settled in France were taken care of by the nation because they were reluctant to work in France. But, reality shows that 55% of the migrants were part of the French labour force. It is absolutely safe to say that these blatantly false claims and accusations made by the politicians have taken a toll on the perspective people have on migration. A survey of 22,500 natives from 6 countries (France, Germany, Italy, Sweden, United Kingdoms, and the United States) clearly revealed this fact. Some of the findings of the survey include, for example, the average migrant population in Italy being

10% while the perception of the natives is that migrants take up 26%. The respondents also overestimated the Muslim migrants. The educational level and skill levels of migrants were also underestimated by the native population.

But what does the term "Napkin Economics" have any significance here? To understand that, we need to know why the facts stated above are ignored by the public and why people blindly follow whatever information is spoon fed to them through


the politicians. The simple reason or so called logic that the politicians use when talking about this is that migrants come from poorer countries to grab the jobs the natives hold. When they migrate to the country, there will be an excess supply of workforce. When there is an excess of supply of workforce, the wages fall. The fall in wages is obviously hurting the natives who used to earn better before migration. We should also account for the faith people have in the basic demand and supply rule we all learned in high school. The simplicity of the law is what has made the arguments a seductive syllogism. The logic is so simple that it can be easily drawn on a piece of napkin and people would still believe it. This is how it got the name "Napkin Economics" which was initially beautifully used by the Nobel Prize Winner Economist duo Abhijith Bannerjee and Esther Duflo.

Why is it wrong? Everything sounds picture perfect when we come to think about it. But the ignorance of us humans again takes over. We have many instances right in front of us which have proven this logic to be flawed and wrong. Experiments done in various countries including Bangladesh have proven that people do not move out of their countries unless they are in a situation where their own country is not helping them improve. The older generations who have adjusted to the situations and are not aware of opportunities beyond their charcoal fuelled fireplace of homes made of mud and straw opted to stay back while the younger generations who are more informed and more open minded decided to take the risk of migrating for a better living. This proves the statement made by arguers against migration that all the people from poorer countries file in through the borders to steal the work and wages of the natives. It is also seen that the migrants do not chase after every dollar they can get. They settle for anything they get because it is usually way higher than what they used to get and experience in their natives.


Another argument raised is that there is excess supply of cheap work force which affects the wages of the natives. Again a real life scenario proved this wrong. When Fidel Castro encouraged the migration of people from Cuba, many boarded boats to the United States. All of these boats came to the Miami coast and the people settled right there. This created an increase in the Miami labour force by 78%. But what happened to the wages? To understand this, an economist David Card compared the rates of employment and wages of prior residents in four other "similar" cities, namely Atlanta, Houston, Los Angeles and Tampa. Card found no difference, either immediately or a few years later the arrival of migrants. The wages of the natives were not affected. As a matter of fact it was found on closer analysis that the natives started getting better positions in jobs. This is because the migrants took up the low level jobs which the natives were hesitant to do themselves. Now that those spots were filled, there were more openings in higher positions which were then offered to the natives. So this, in a way, is a positive effect on the wages of the natives. It

was also proven in the same study that the production and output level of the economy from the state of Miami showed a good increase post migration. This same situation can be extended to the Czech migrants in Germany and the migrants from Nepal going to other countries. All these real life instances prove the logic we hear repeatedly being used for the sake of votes is incorrect.

The ignorance of humans is inevitable and dreaming of a world full of perfectly informed people taking the perfect decision is just dreaming about a utopian world. The emotions have always been famous for taking over our logical sides. But, you are an exception. The next time you see someone raising the same argument or see the same being talked about in a political debate, you know what perspective to hold and what facts or statements to be believed and what to be discarded. This same knowledge should be spread to other people. This call to action is not just for a bunch of academic economists who work hard and publish research papers that the general public bothers the least about. It is for all of us who want a better, saner, and more human world.

lood donation is a small act of kindness that does great and big wonders. Every year Seshadripuram College organises a Mega Blood Donation Festival in commemoration

of the birth anniversary of Late Shri K.M. Nanjappa. He was a former mayor of Bangalore and a former President of the Seshadripuram Educational Trust. This year it was on the 30th of January inaugurated by our college alumnus and acclaimed Kannada actor Vijay Raghavendra. Vijay who is the son of producer S. A. Chinne Gowda and nephew of actor Rajkumar.

Mr Vijay Raghavendra started his career as a child artist through the film *Chalisuva Modagalu* (1982) and won critical acclaim for his performances in *Chinnari Mutha* (1993) and *Kotreshi Kanasu* (1994). The latter film won him the National Film Award for Best Child Artist. He studied at Poorna Pragna school and later did his BCom from Seshadripuram College in the 2001 batch.

The camp was held in collaboration with Karnataka Red Cross Blood Bank along with many participating organisations such as Rotary Bangalore Centennial District 3190, Indian Red Cross Society Blood Bank and other units such as Youth Red Cross, National Service Scheme, Rangers and Rovers and more. Students from our college and other institutions had gathered to stand a chance to be a hero in someone's life.

Everybody present there was enthusiastic to donate blood. For many, it was their first time and they were excited and nervous at the same time but our seniors at the help desk and the volunteers made it easy and simple.

There were a series of procedures to undergo before anyone could donate their blood. Starting from the first, they had to fill a form with important contents like name, address, blood type and health regarded questions.

The volunteers would then lead the prospective donors to the doctors present there who would check the pulse, body temperature, haemoglobin levels, blood pressure, weight and would

also ask health regarded questions like if they had any major surgery, typhoid, dog bite and many more to make sure that a person would

qualified to donate. Any person with any restricted conditions would be rejected from donating.

The doctors, staff, teachers, students and seniors took necessary precautions right from wearing the mask, checking the body temperature to sanitizing the place and maintaining social distance.

> The qualified students were asked to have breakfast and then the blood would be taken. Depending on physical conditions, 350 ml to 450 ml would be taken. After donating the blood, many of them felt lightheaded, dizzy and nauseous. So, to make sure that the donors would regain some strength and to feel better, the college offered delicious lunch and beverages.

> > The students were

really happy about being a donor and having a satisfaction that somewhere, someone would live a life that they wanted to because of them. The student donors were rewarded with a certificate, mask and a soap which were essential to protect themselves and others from the spreading Coronavirus. The presence of the students for donating blood during these difficult times was highly appreciated by everybody.

Donating blood just doesn't give you a sense of happiness but it also tends to improve one's emotional well-being. It has an impact on stress reduction. Above all, the donor has a physical benefit that is a lower risk of heart disease and it is an opportunity to get a free basic health check-up. Many of them who weren't eligible to donate the blood were disappointed but made their way to help and cheer up their fellow mates who were donating blood. Encouraging your friends, family, neighbourhood to become regular blood donors is a way of creating awareness and making people understand how crucial it is to donate blood. The greatest and the most valuable gift that you can ever give someone is the gift of life. Never feel yourself weak, you have the ability to save a life. Just donate blood.

The MAN Who WALKED for PEACE

the E.P. Menon Story

was born in Kerala but moved to Bangalore when I was 24 years and this must be 1958, may be. I was really fond of Bertrand Russell's ideologies. He was arrested by Brit government for actually telling them to eliminate nuclear weapons and 25000 students followed him and he spoke about this in Trafalgar Square. He made a statement from the prison 'I want the youth of the world to rise up, unite and act, politicians will ruin the world' and he was 91 years old at that time and those were the kind of statements he gave back then."

"I was in Bangalore when I read the Deccan Herald where I saw Russell's statement, I was 27 years old and I thought for the whole day as to what I can do for the world. I felt like something





should be done, I decided to take a walk to England and meet him at his prison. I decided to write him a letter about how he inspired me and asked him what should I do. In a month, I got a response from him saying 'This is wonderful, you must do things according to your conviction.' There was a man who opposed the government, got arrested and put in prison but I still got a response from him, I was on top of the world."

The planning

"I, in 1962 decided to go on a walk for peace. I had asked three people before I had asked Satish Kumar. I wrote to Satish Kumar and he was from Bihar, I had just met him a year ago. I wrote to him about my plan and asked him to come down to Bangalore. One month later he came down and we decided to do it but he told me there was a problem. His wife was

pregnant and it was just a year ago that he had gotten married and also told that it was a difficult task. We both decided to go and talk to her about this. I sat with the both of them and I told her 'Do you believe in stories from Rajasthan where the men went to war and the women put tilak on their forehead and sent them to the battle?' and I asked 'Your husband and I are going on a similar trip, would you put tilak on him?' she was shocked and this went on for three hours. She agreed but asked us to wait for five months as she was pregnant. We decided to wait for her baby to be delivered, we planned the trip and decided to start our journey on the 1st of June 1962."

o, we both started from Delhi on the 1st of June 1962, one month later, we reached Wagah border and even after a month, I didn't have my visa or passport. Two more days to go to Pakistan and journalists started asking me what we'd do. I said 'One thing I'm sure, I'll be in either Ayub Khan's jail or Nehru's jail'. Next day the Pak radio announces that they have granted visa for the both of us. It was just for the two of us."

Pakistan

"In Pakistan, we had to walk for a month from this border to the border where Afghanistan was there through Khyber Pass. The cops there told us that the pass was very dangerous for us and for this, the local inspector sent four men to walk with us. It was a 20 km journey and after a few minutes we asked the men to go back and told them nothing will happen to us and to be honest, they respected that and by the next day we reached Afghan."



Soviet Union

"It took us 10 months to reach Moscow. The route was Delhi, Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iran and then we reached the Soviet Union. The PM was Nikita Khrushchev and they were expecting us. They made our stay at a hotel and their secretary gave a message to us that they wanted the USA to respond to the Nuclear weapon ban agreement. They asked us to get Pres. John F. Kennedy and where ever they found him, PM Khrushchev would come and sign the same agreement. We told them, we were no one and asked them to give us a letter which would be delivered to Pres. John F. Kennedy."

Paris to England

"From Moscow to Paris, it took us five months as we had to travel through the Eastern and middle EU. When we reached Paris, it was August '63 and by then we had made friends and they asked us to stay with them. We wanted to meet the president but it was two weeks and we couldn't even get to meet Franc Mitterrand. On the 16th of Aug '63, both of us went with a cut-out that said

'Total Nuclear Disarmament' and stood in front of Palace Élysée. 50 cops came and arrested us. By 4th day evening, the jailer called the Indian Ambassador and we all sat together and they told us that they will deport us back to Delhi but the ambassador suggested that we continue our journey and we were made to go to England on a midnight train."

e reached England and wanted to go meet Bertrand Russell. He was in a huge mansion and got to spend a week's time with him. He was 93 by then and we could speak very less in those few days but he gave us a copy of his book. From England we took a ship to New York and from NYC to Washington, it took us two months and while it was leaving South Hampton, we were in the largest ship in the world 'Queen Mary'. We got into the ship and there were about 4000 passengers on that ship and it was maybe 12 noon when we get the news that US Pres. John F. Kennedy was assassinated. The food that was being served, was stopped because no one wanted to eat anything, we were just sad and shocked for the next five days on the ship."

The US to India

"We wanted to walk from the UN HQ to The White House and it took us two months to do that. Once we reached the White House, the then president Lyndon B. Johnson discussed with his Disarmament secretary and we got to talk to them for almost three hours. We delivered the letter that was given to us by Soviet PM Khrushchev. President Johnson told 'Please bring Khrushchev, we will sign the deal', the same thing that the Soviet PM told. Though we travelled around the country, that the end of our story."

"You know it is the question of your commitment and your concern through action. Why should we have so many boundaries in the world? National boundaries are one of the greatest enemies of humans. Break the boundaries. Sovereignty, nationalism is by and large, against humanity. What does matter whether you are in India, US, Japan or Russia. They are humans too; they treat you as human beings too. That's most important. I am E.P. Menon."

According to Johan no human in this world is entirely good and with a little manipulation we can easily bring out the monster in any human


human beings are grey


in nature.
