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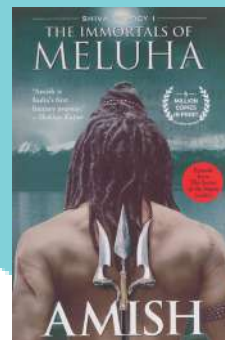


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Editorial

HIERARCHY

T

here is a theory that explains the hierarchy system our human brains are programmed to see society in. This theory connects it to the life of a lobster in a community of lobsters. It

has been famously propagated by Jordan B Peterson in his book 12 Rules of Life: An Antidote to Chaos. I will be making several references to the same, but you need not have any previous knowledge of the book to get your head around the references. There was a time when Kings used to fight to conquer more land and expand their kingdoms. This desire to establish and gain territory of humans has been seen exactly as it is in lobsters and their behaviour. Lobsters have been observed to fight for territories. A fight usually results in winners and losers. Upon examination of chemicals in the brains of the lobsters who lost this fight, scientists discovered that the chemical changes in the brains of the lobsters lead to them losing confidence just like how human brains react upon losing a similar fight. Moreover, it was also observed that the lobsters who lost the fight for territory also reflected their lack of confidence and low “social status” among the rest of the community of lobsters in their physical postures. So what does all this have to do with hierarchy? It is all about dominance exerted by the other lobsters which lead to the creation of hierarchies.

This dominant hierarchy behaviour is something that branched off humans in an evolutionary sense (lobsters are arthropods) a long time ago. Just like humans, lobsters exist in hierarchies and have a nervous system attuned to the status which “runs on serotonin” (a brain chemical often associated with feelings of happiness).

The higher a lobster goes up the hierarchical ladder, the more serotonin is available. This is also the reason behind the chemical changes mentioned earlier with regards to losing territory. The lost lobsters also face a fall in serotonin levels, which is reflected in their mental and physical states. The more defeat it suffers, the more restricted the serotonin supply. Lower serotonin is in turn associated with more negative emotions – perhaps making it harder to climb back up the ladder. Hierarchies in humans work in a similar way – we are wired to live in them. The nervous systems of humans and lobsters are in fact so similar that antidepressants work on lobsters. One such drug, Prozac, has been shown to block serotonin uptake into serotonergic nerve terminals in lobsters. So yes, because the molecule is the same and the nerve terminals are very similar, the drug does what it was designed to do. But it did not make lobsters happier.

“It’s inevitable that there would be continuity in the way that animals and humans organize their systems,” Peterson said in an interview. However, we are aware of how society shapes us into the people we are. Even the quantity of serotonin generated by people is affected by a variety of external and internal circumstances. For example, “stereotype danger” is a psychological phenomenon in which people are concerned about talents that they connect with members of another group. We now know that negative emotions alter brain activity. According to one study, those who thought of themselves as having a lower social standing than others had different quantities of grey matter in brain areas involved in feeling emotions and reacting to stress than those who did not. This can be seen in the self-esteem and emotional status of someone who considers themselves as a loser. Some people may continue to see themselves as inferior to the guy who bullied them in school, while their brains adapt to this “reality”. If we instead choose to believe that all humans are unique and equal – and we have the power to make society fairer – this will change our brains too. It is a clear example of how attitudes can alter both brains and behaviour.

We can choose to replicate the social structure of ancient creatures if we want to cling to the past. However, lobsters’ extended survival is a sign of how effectively they have adapted to their surroundings — and how little that habitat has altered. Human ancestors emerged from the sea, developing lungs, vocal cords, and a variety of other features. We’ve explored continents, developed flying aircraft, and even live on the other side of the planet. Change and challenge are what we want. We also strive to improve and promote mankind by making our society fairer and more balanced. Moreover, there exist other problems if we try to emulate the social structures of animals. Hierarchies abound in the animal realm, with insects displaying the highest amount of organization. These creatures are as similar to humans as lobsters in that they have serotonin and neurological systems. The queen is substantially larger than the males and the sole reproductive female in the world of bees. After being fertilized by multiple men, she lays all of the eggs in the colony. Males are pushed out of the colony after mating season and perish. Would it be okay if we chose to organize society in this “natural” way? That would be some food for thought and fuel for some Generation Z Twitter discussion threads.

Humans have displayed striking similarities in terms of neural structure or neural responses and brain chemicals to that of certain animals, birds, and insects. There will be similarities in the working of human societies with certain aspects of certain animal societies. This again goes back to how their neurons react to the situational chemicals produced in the brain. This is a product of evolution. But is this enough to say that humans will display a striking continuity in the way humans and animals organize their societies? I personally would disagree due to the extent of changes human societies have put human brains through, over and beyond what animal societies have achieved, and thus increasing the factors involved in how a hierarchical society is formed and is continued in the human world. ■

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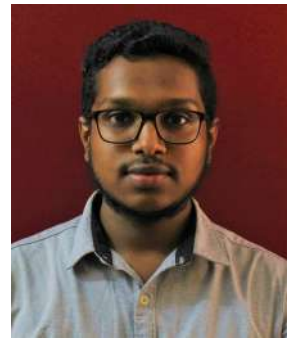
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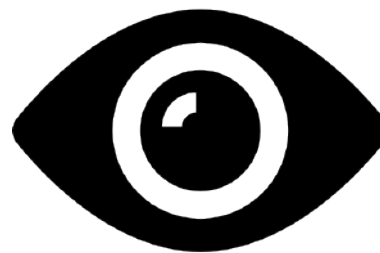

DECEMBER FOOTBALL ROUNDUP

This month's football has been spectacular with a lot of upsets in the mix. With teams like FC Barcelona being stuck in quicksand, losing out on a place in the UEFA Champions League round of 16 and some absolute trashings, with Manchester City's 7-0 victory over Leeds United at the Etihad. Some managerial issues with the Champions League caused a bit of drama as well. Let's get into the standing of the big 4 of football and some exciting games you missed this month.



LA LIGA

The Spaniards have had their own share of exciting matches this month. Few unexpected stars for teams and a few letdowns as well. Sevilla performs swimmingly with a not so surprising win against Athletic Madrid, who have lost 3 out of their last 3 in the league. Barcelona scrapes through to secure 7 points in December of their last 3 games sitting in 7th (Yes, 7th, the Catalonian giants sit below UEFA Europa Cup slots). Real Madrid leads the league with 5 points in their hands with a 9 game unbeaten streak. Real Madrid sits on the throne in 1st place, followed by Sevilla, Real Betis, Rayo Vallecano, Athletic Madrid and Real Sociedad in that order. Real Madrid's Karim Benzema leads the goals scored this season (13), consistently poaching goals for the galacticos with support from Vinicius Jr. (10), performing the best he has since joining Real Madrid.





PREMIER LEAGUE

The main league from England is currently a three-horse race, with Liverpool, Manchester City, and Chelsea being comfortable ahead of the rest of the pack. Liverpool and Man City keep their run consistent with a perfect run in December. Liverpool performs on par if not better than Man City dropping 0 points this month. The third horse in the race, Chelsea, had a few difficulties this season dropping 5 points in their last 5 games. These teams are 8 points clear or more of Arsenal, West Ham, and Man Utd. in a close battle for 4th. Tottenham and Wolverhampton follow them in 7th and 8th. Liverpool dominates player stats with the top 2 scorers in the league, Mo. Salah. and Diego Jota at 15 and 9 goals respectively.



SERIE A

Italy has also had its fair share of disappointment with Turin's pride, Juventus, letting its fans down and placing 7th. The rivalry from Milan between Inter and AC, after taking a break during the Juventus supremacy, are back with Internazionale being only 4 points away from a closely following AC Milan. Milan dropped 2 points against 14th place Udinese, easing the title race slightly. Atalanta follows AC Milan being only 6 points behind Inter after a demoralizing 1-4 defeat by Roma. The Italian league is as entertaining that ever with 2 legendary teams rising after a rough patch in their careers, making it one of the best-contested leagues.



LEAGUE UN

Feels like Deja Vu, The French league being overwhelmed by their capital team, Paris Saint-Germain is 13 points clear of 2nd place Marseille. Rennes follow Marseille closely being only 1 point behind. The UEFA Europa League competition in France is very tight with Nice, Montpellier, Lens, Strasbourg, Monaco, Angers, Nantes and last season Champions LOSC Lille all battling it out for the 4th and 5th. Jonathan David from Lille leads the goal-scoring table after slotting 11 past French league men between the sticks.



BUNDESLIGA

It is Bayern Munchen again, it has been Bayern since 2013 in Germany. The club from Munich has been the champions for a long time and have no plans of giving it up. They stand 1st with 43 points, in 2nd with 34 points stand Borussia Dortmund. Leverkusen, Hoffenheim, Frankfurt follow the German giants in 3rd, 4th and 5th respectively. Robert Lewandowski has scored 19 goals this season in the Bundesliga and has been a huge factor for Bayern's success this season. The hype around Borussia Dortmund with their prodigy, Erling Braut Haland has been immense. The league feels unchanged from the past decade with the same winner but still has had quite a few nail-biting ends and thrillers.



CHAMPIONS LEAGUE

The group stages of the UEFA Champions League has just been settled, deciding the top 16 teams from all of European Club Football. The round of 16 draw was conducted on the 14th of December 2021 and it was conducted twice. The first draw was discarded due to a series of errors on UEFA's side. The first error occurred when Manchester United were drawn against Villarreal, which shouldn't have happened as they were in the same group. Manchester United's ball was not placed in the bowl to be picked against Atletico Madrid. This error went unnoticed and when UEFA realised this, they conducted the same round of 16 draw a few hours later. This deprives us of the Messi vs Ronaldo spectacle, but the new fixtures are quite spicy of their own.

It was a 3-day event that was held on 26th November 2021, for the 1st year students, on 14th December for the second-year students, and on 15th December 2021 for the final year students respectively.

The program was exclusively conducted for the students of all the years of the college. The program was headed by a resource person, Suja Sukumaran, Co-Head; Rehabilitation and Reintegration, Enfold Proactive Health Trust. The program was attended by students from different streams. The event was organized to motivate the students into learning & respecting each other's personal space at the workplace and the right way to voice out any kind of harassment that was faced. It also covered Awareness of Sexual Harassment and POSH Act, 2013 (Prevention of Sexual Harassment)

The guest speaker Suja Sukumaran, gave us her valuable insights and thoughts on the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) and its importance of it in every workplace not just in college. She covered various different topics during her speech. Which includes how gender-biased treatments are to be faced in society, Honor and Shame, Personal space zones, learning to say "No", and many more interesting and relative topics were covered in the session.

Humans are animals that have evolved into their current form over time. Throughout history, there has always been a deep bond between animals and people. The majority of the drawings from the Stone Age depicted animals rather than people. Wild and ferocious animals captivated humans. They would kill wild animals and use their fur to cover their bodies and add jewelry to their bones. Later, a belief system known as animism became popular. Netflix is an American subscription streaming service and production company launched on August 29, 1997, founded by Reed Hastings and Marc Randolph in Scott's

Valley, California. It offers a library of movies and television series through distributions as well as their own productions, known as 'Netflix Originals'. Netflix initially sold and rented DVDs by mail. The sale was eliminated within a year as they wanted to focus more on the DVD rental business. In 2007 Netflix introduced streaming media and video on demand. The company expanded its business to Canada followed by Europe, the Middle East, Africa, and Asia. Netflix entered the content-production industry in 2013 with a debuting series "The House of Cards" and now Netflix has the best movies and television series. People spent most of their time exploring different genres on such OTT platforms. It has made people realize the importance of entertainment in life.

BOOK REVIEW ON THE IMMORTALS OF MELUHA



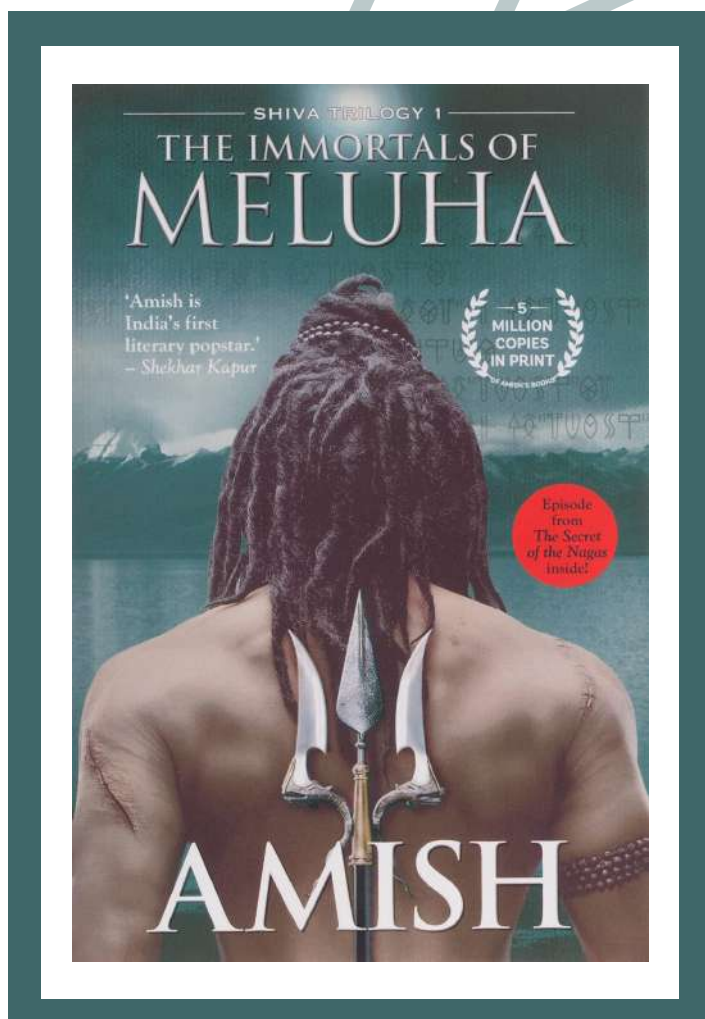

ASSASSIN'S CREED

Assassin's Creed is one of the very few game series that had me go back and replay them just so that I can understand it in its true sense and with much more clarity but always leaves me with even more questions after playing it over and over, and maybe that is the real beauty of these games, that these are just not the mindless, going all over killing everyone and exploding stuff but something so sophisticated which forces you to think, it helps us in bringing some perspective in our lives and there is lots to learn from the main characters of these games, not all of them have a very good and smooth life, they all make mistakes and all of their action have consequences. Maybe it looks like too much thinking for a game but believes me once you start playing them, you will understand what I am talking about. The plots of these games could be one of the hardest to understand and requires your total attention to the details and cutscene to be aware of what you are actually trying to achieve by your actions and if not paid attention, you will lose track and eventually find it boring, confusing or repetitive, especially the first few games which were purely story-driven.

In this review, I am going to talk about the game which started it all. The first game of this franchise, "Assassin's Creed". I will brief you on the premise of the game so mild spoilers ahead. The game has two stories in it, the one which takes place in the present world and the other which takes place in the past.

It starts with you playing Desmond Miles, who is a bartender in New York. He is kidnapped by a shady organisation called "Abstergo". It's run by an old man named Warren Vidic. As the game progresses you get to know that the Abstergo organization is just a fake front for a faction called "Templars". Templar's sole objective has always been to take hold of everyone's freedom and by doing that they plan on establishing peace in the world. Assassin's on the other hand are Templar's rival faction who believes that there can never be a peaceful world without freedom and gives importance to free will above anything else. The rivalry of Assassin's and Templars have been going for centuries and still prevails even in the modern world.

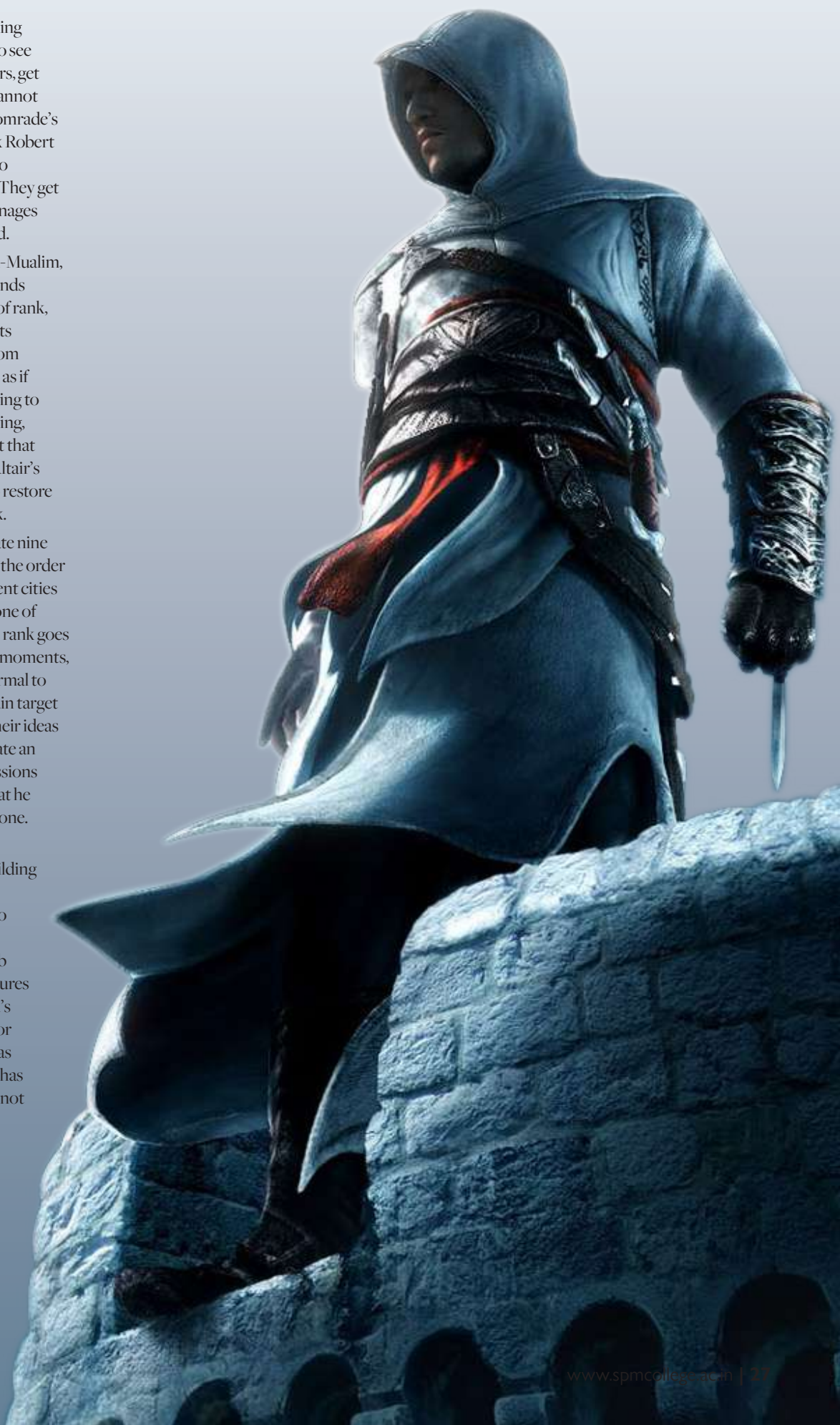
Later in-game you also find out that you are the successor of the Assassin's brotherhood, and the reason Abstergo kidnapped you was to force you to enter in a machine called Animus which allows you to relive your ancestral memories by using the genetic code in your DNA. They are doing this because your ancestor, an assassin in the 12th century, "Altair Ibn La-Ahad" possessed a powerful artifact called "The Apple" which is one of the many "Pieces of Eden" (the one who possesses these artifacts has the control over humans and the reality) so that Templars can find out the location of the artifact. After you enter animus, the game starts with you playing as Altair in the 12th century.

Altair is in Solomon's temple and looking for the apple with his comrades only to see Robert De Sable, the leader of Templars, get to it first. The Altair after seeing this cannot keep his patience and disregards his comrade's suggestions. He goes directly to attack Robert but fails to do so and loses his friends to Templars because of his carelessness. They get in a tight spot but Altair somehow manages to escape but his friends are left behind.

Looking at Altair's action, Al-Mualim, the leader of Assassin's order, reprimands Altair and demotes him to the lowest of rank, stripping him off of all his achievements and making him to start everything from scratch. Altair is now made the novice as if it was his first day in the order. According to Al-Mualim, this punishment was nothing, instead, he should have been killed, but that would just be a waste of his time and Altair's talent so he is given another chance to restore his honor and earn his way up the rank.

Altair is given a job to assassinate nine renowned leaders who are disrupting the order of Assassins. He travels to three different cities and gathers information to find each one of them to assassinate. With each kill, his rank goes up by a certain level and in their dying moments, all of them makes confessions (it is normal to have a short conversation with the main target in their dying moments) about how their ideas were to only for the people and to create an ideal world. By hearing all their confessions Altair starts questioning himself if what he is doing is really the right thing to be done.

The Assassin's Creed takes a very philosophical approach in its story building to make you assess the situation and ideologies of both sides. The game also has many real characters for example all the targets that you are given the job to assassinate are the real historical figures who died in 1191. You will like Assassin's creed if you are into stealth gameplay or history or both. Considering that it was released almost 14 years ago the game has aged well according to me. There was not a game that could come close to it in the detailing that has been done in its environment and is still presentable in today's time. I would recommend everyone who is interested in stealth, history with a touch of philosophy and modern science, and Parkour-ing across the ancient cities to play Assassin's creed.■
